


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


Czech Cluster Organisations 2016

Smart Cluster Policy categories of indicators

1.	DURABILITY	the length of time span of the document/programme operation (long - medium - short term duration)
2.	AUTONOMY	cluster dedicated document/programme - part of another policy - clusters just mentioned
3.	FUNCTIONALITY	the degree of the document force vertically (decree/strategic document/recommendation) and horizontally (throughout all departments)
4.	VIABILITY	an existing entrusted governance body and public budget allocation
5.	CONTINUITY	permanent part of policy-making tools, regular updates or just recently included/stopped
6.	INTEGRITY	covering all kinds of sectors and industries with no limitations
7.	COMPLEXITY	relevant support for all cluster development stages
8.	CONSISTENCY	provision of additional supportive measures (accreditation, training, awareness building)

Considerations on Public Policy

<u>Three fundamental considerations</u> when talking about clusters:

- **Build on local differences**: competitive advantage is based on being different. It makes no sense to try to clone two clusters in the same industry and same territory **the cluster mapping and cluster analysis tools**.
- Understand which industries cluster: not all industries tend to cluster and clustering principles are not useful for each industry. Some industries, such as petrochemicals, do not need to cluster the cluster initiative and cluster actors facilitation tool.
- Understand the cluster life cycle: governments must differentiate actions in line with the cluster life cycle needs – measures (funding) ensuring the commitment, comprehensiveness and continuity of the cluster policy.

Three pillars of cluster policy:

- ✓ Creating favourable local conditions and correct market functioning.
- ✓ Fostering dialogue between firms and government through a cluster organisation.
- ✓ The government acts as a careful manager and sophisticated client.

Let's make our cluster policies SMART !

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Cluster policy be in competence of a supra-departmental government organ – the support open for all sectors and industries encompassing all cluster development stages;

Mobilise regional policy-makers to adopt and implement cluster policies – mapping, facilitation and cluster organisation incubation. Capitalise clusters within RIS3;

Build awareness, build the capacities, train cluster management teams and promote cluster achievements;

Establish the national system of cluster organisation accreditation, measure and monitor their performance and cluster policy impacts;

Create a long-term, durable and devoted political environment for clusters, the return of invested capital is worth the efforts!

- openness
- fair competition and business
- mutual learning and sharing experience
- searching for synergies and development opportunities
- focus on professional excellence
